

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



When Autumn Leaves Start to Fall - Lynn Ankney, President

s I type this message for publication in our November newsletter, my kitchen window is open, I hear the faint sound of the Blue Line's clickety-clack in the distance and it's 75 degrees. We're enjoying an extended summer with warm, sunny weather today, and yet just a couple of days ago, it was crisp and cool, with leaves swirling through the air on their way to the ground. That's Autumn in Chicago for you.

Regardless of Mother's Nature's whims, we can bet that the leaves will fall in droves. Please be aware of a new citywide effort to assist residents in clearing their yards, parkway and storm drains. The city has a new service to collect bagged leaf and yard waste. The details below were provided by Alderman John Arena's 45th Ward Update:

- Starting October 17 through November 30, residents can call either 311 or my office at 773-286-4545 (Note: 39th Ward Office is 773-736-5594) to request separate bagged leaf collection.
- Leaves and other yard waste should be left in the alley or at the curb for collection, and

bagged separately from garbage in the black carts and separately from recycling in the blue carts. A Department of Streets and Sanitation truck will collect the bags based on 311 requests and take it to be composted.

OIPA BOARD | MEETING REPORT

Summarized Minutes of the Board Meeting

on October 17, 2016— Bart Goldberg, Secretary

Attendees: Lynn Ankney, Howard Silver, Anna Sobor, Joan Tunney, Meredith O'Sullivan, Adrienne Chan, Colleen Kenny, and Bart Goldberg

The Board meeting commenced at 7:05 p.m..

Appointment of Additional Board Members: Since only two people ran for the open spots on the Board, and several other spots remain to be filled, we were delighted to learn that Adrienne Chan and Colleen Kenny were both interested in serving. After speaking with them, the present Board members voted unanimously to appoint them to two year terms on the Board. We were pleased that they both live north of Irving Park Road as our present Board tended to be concentrated on the other side. They are both clearly going to offer a lot in terms of talent to the Board. Adrienne is a lawyer with a major firm and was previously involved with the Junior League in Chicago. Colleen works with a large advertising firm, and we are already tapping into her expertise to help us set advertising rates for our website. Welcome to both of them.

Treasurer's Reports: The Treasurer's Report for the prior month were approved unanimously by the Board pending audit. Howard also reported that paid membership for the new fiscal year is picking up, with the renewals from the procrastinators (such as myself) still steadily coming in, but that as happens every year we now need to try to reach out to those that have not renewed.

4300 W. Berteau: Some of you are probably sick of me reporting about this distressed six unit building, but it seems to have more lives than the proverbial cat. The demolition that was previously ordered did

not occur, and now it has been at least temporarily stayed due to the petition of a mortgage lender.

Schurz Field Proposal: Alderman Arena and his staff are continuing to work on the proposal for the improved field (this topic has been discussed in this newsletter many times over the past year) and are now in the process of obtaining TIF funds for that purpose and some other improvements for the school. We were asked to write a letter to the City to support the proposal, but we declined at this time since we first want to see the Plan of Operation for how the field would be managed and funded in the future.

Other Matters: Some of the other matters discussed included the continuing efforts to address the homeless problem under the Irving Park viaducts, the Independence Park Library, Brudders, and 4301 W. Montrose (where President Ankney will be attending the community meeting being held by Alderman Laurino to address the problems there).

Thank Yous: The Board wants to thank Anna Sobor for the very hard manual labor she performed weeding and tending to our planters on Irving Park Road, and to Megan Stalder for all of her help working with Joan Tunney, President Ankney and Lisa Hazen on our new website. I have heard that it is really looking good, though some work still continues.

Hands to Help Dinner: In conjunction with the Six Corners Association, BuildOn, and OIPA, they will hold a free taco dinner from 5 to 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, November 3rd at the Irving Park Lutheran Church.

The meeting adjourned at about 8:30 p.m..

One of the two was prepared to stave off the boredom from our meeting by reading a book, and his younger sister, Elise, pressed her mother (President Ankney) to please specify exactly the terms of their bargain; namely the type of and the time at which she would receive the dessert that she had been promised. While many people thought this funny, a few others were heard to grumble about having attended without any such reward. The Board heard you loud and clear and you will he fed next month

COMMITTEE REPORTS & ANNOUNCEMENTS

Neighborhood Projects

President Ankney updated the membership on many of the ongoing projects in the neighborhood, including that the website is now up and running, and that the Six Corners Association was just honored to win an award concerning urban revitalization and that they will be hosting the national meeting of the Main Street Commission in early November. She also updated us on the rather bizarre theft that occurred recently at the Irving Park Food Pantry. While arguably more valuable things such as computers or their stache of food were

ignored, their entire stock of toiletries was stolen. Someone now has a whole lot of toilet paper and toothpaste. This is truly a serious matter as hundreds of people depend on the Food Pantry for such things. Many people have given generously to help replenish the loss, and our local automobile magnate, **Mike**Berman, deserves special praise as he stepped up big time to donate \$1,000 to the Pantry

OIPA Board Elections

As advertised, an election was held where there were only two candidates and more than two open positions on the Board. However, right before anyone could vote for or against Meredith O'Sullivan or Anna **Sobor** one long standing member of the community stood up to ask a rather pertinent question of the candidates, which I will paraphrase as follows: "This has been such an ugly campaign. Nothing but personal attacks without the first discussion of an issue. I know I speak for many of us when I say that I cannot wait for this election to be over. With all of this in mind, and in the hopes that we can heal the rifts in our community, and in the spirit of last night's presidential debate, do you think that the two of you could possibly say something nice about one other? Since this will probably be harder for Anna, I would suggest that Meredith answer first". After a brief but stunned silence, Meredith and Anna just smiled and gave each other a heartfelt hug, and they were then promptly and unanimously elected. Congratulations to Meredith and Anna! And congratulations to all of us that they have agreed to serve once again. (Editorial Note: Very little of the above actually occurred, but in the spirit of "truthiness" instead of "truth" during this political season, it seemed true enough).



OIPA GENERAL MEETING REPORT

Main Speaker - BuildOn Organization

Dan Alberti from BuildOn Chicago spoke to us about the amazing work of this group, particularly as it relates to Schurz High School and our community. To those of you out there who are as skeptical as your appointed scribe, I want to assure you that this group is more than legit. They are a huge NFP, but a look at their website reveals that they have had a four star rating from the Charity Navigator for the last twelve years, and their Board is populated with many big names from the world of industry. Even Barack Obama is an honorary board member. They were founded in 1992 by an ex General Electric Co. executive named Jim Ziolkowski, who went to Nepal to build a school. Jim Ziolkowski wrote a book. Walk in Their Shoes. about his experience, which was praised by the Dalai Lama. Wow, when an organization is supported by both Misters Obama and Lama they have to be doing something right.

Dan explained that BuildOn supports and works in some of the poorest countries on the planet to build schools in villages that have historically had no adequate school structure. They have now built over 1,000 schools and over 500 in the last five years. And, BuildOn's service learning programs in the U.S. mobilize students in challenging urban areas to lift up their communities through intensive local service. Many of their local participants (such as students at Schurz) have traveled globally to help with construction. But their primary function here in the states is to encourage public service in the schools with the goal of helping to break poverty and low expectation cycles. Public service is required in Chicago high schools and BuildOn offers an after school program where students can serve and get both the hours and the positive experience. Many of the students go way beyond the minimums that are required, and last year about a dozen students at Schurz gave more than 400 hours of their time for the various causes, such as the Food Lab. BuildOn's national statistics show that students in the program are 2.5 times more likely to attend school and that a full 93% continue on to college. Dan also stressed that they offer many options for adults to volunteer as well, and of course they encourage financial giving too. TIP FROM YOUR NEIGHBOR



very season has its definitive, nostalgia-inducing scent. For me, the holidays mean the sweetness of apple cider, and the warmth of cinnamon from freshly baked cookies. But you don't have to start baking to make your home or business smell inviting. Instead, use fruit, spices and simmering water to act as a natural aromatic air freshener. During the holidays in our house and shop, there will inevitably be a pot warming on the stove, bubbling away and bringing a smile to everyone's face as they walked through our front door.

Making up packages of our favorite simmering spice blends has become our go-to hostess and business thank-you gifts over the years. The best part: the mixture can be used over and over, until the scent has faded.

Here's what you'll need: saucepan, wooden spoon, water and simmering spices pack. Put the water in the saucepan and put it on your stovetop. Bring the water to a simmer or until light steam comes from the uncovered pan. Depending on how much potpourri you have, you can also use a cooking pot or a crock pot. As the water simmers, add in your spices, stirring them while turning the heat to low. Once you can smell the spices, you're done! Sit back and enjoy.

Need inspiration? Create a citrus-spicy scent by combining whole cinnamon sticks, whole cloves, one sliced apple and a sliced orange. (I would also add a half-cup of fresh cranberries!) Prefer a more Christmas scent? Combine 3 springs of evergreen, 2 whole cinnamon sticks, 2 T whole cloves, 2 bay leaves, and a couple of pieces of orange and lemon rind.

IMPORTANT: Never allow the simmering potpourri to dry up, and never leave a boiling pot unattended. Check on your simmering pot every 30 minutes or so, and add water if the pot's water level looks low – or more spices if the scent is fading.




