
More About OIPA President Lynn Ankey

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

aced with a long cold winter ahead, Irving Park Garden Club members took solace in a presentation on backyard birds given by **Roberta Asher** from the Chicago Audubon Society (CAS). She entertained and enlightened us in October at our last meeting of the 2017 season—and she delivered bags of birdseed our members ordered from the CAS wild birdseed sale.

More than 40 attendees enjoyed pizza and wine as we learned more about the habits of birds common to our

Hine. neighborhood, including cardinals, robins, chickadees, mourning doves, nuthatches, blue jays, house finches, sparrows, hummingbirds, and woodpeckers. Asher gave us tips on how to attract the birds we want, and we listened to recordings of their calls so we could identify their songs.


She said Montrose Point Bird Sanctuary is a great place to visit in spring and fall when birds are migrating. Bird watchers can expect to see many colorful species in large quantities in the meadow at the lakefront.

We heard about Chicago Bird Collision Monitors, an all-volunteer group that helps protect and rescue migratory birds that collide with buildings in the Loop. Teams spend early morning hours recovering injured birds, and the organization collaborates with building managers and architects to prevent bird collisions.

Some terrific door prizes were given away, including a birdbath donated by **Christine and Chris Gorz**; six centerpieces donated by **Sue Geisler**, and several large containers donated by **Gina Iliopoulos and Ed Caplan**.

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
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Spring Classes, Summer Camp and 'Forts!' Plays On








eeler Gardens has been offering programs to connect with nature for about a year now, and we felt it was time to give our neighbors an update along with our heartfelt thanks.

We had a very active year speaking at the Chicago Flower and Garden Show, the Chicago Botanic Garden, and Lincoln Park Zoo. We had programs in schools, camps, and with cultural groups. We've opened Keeler Gardens to the community for both private and public events and supported nearby churches, the local garden club, and our community members.

We've partnered with other groups to expand our offerings:

- We are a demonstration site for the Bionutrient Food Association focusing on rebuilding our soil for nutrient dense produce.
- Host bee hives for Sloanstead honey building our natural habitat.
- One of the first organizations to provide opportunities through the youth-oriented Yolobe app piloted at Schurz High School.

ur dear friend Ken Little was one of kind. A husband, a father, a grandfather, a retired Senior Fire Alarm Operator for the Chicago Fire Department, a teacher of Chicago History at Wright Jr. College and he was also, Very Important Person (VIP) to the Irving Park Historical Society. From being a popular quest speaker, addressing a number of local history topics at meetings, to helping add color through the use of objects and commentary at a number of our Housewalks. Ken was one of those rare people who touched lives in a rich way. Ken could talk your ear off but made you want to listen to him for hours. He was our homegrown expert on not just city history but the Chicago Fire Department — its houses, services, apparatuses, communications, and most importantly the stories of its people.

Ken co-wrote several books, four volumes of the history of Chicago firehouses with Fire Department Chaplain Father John McNalis, and helped found the Fire Museum of Greater Chicago. He was described as one of the best fire alarm operators the Fire Department ever had. Former Chicago Fire Commissioner James Joyce said, "He had a second sense for what fire companies were closest," Joyce said. "He was amazing."

He and his wife Alice, who died in 1986, had ten children, including triplets.

Construction Expected on New Library

The new Independence Branch Library, 4024 N. Elston, received demolition and building permits from the City of Chicago in December. Demolition and construction is expected to begin late winter to early spring, weather permitting.

For decades, neighbors and library users have lobbied for a new library. After the library's former location closed in 2015 due to smoke damage from an adjacent fire, momentum grew for a new and improved facility. In October, 2016, it was announced that the library would have a permanent home where the former Hollerbach Funeral Home was located

The building is a unique collaboration between the Chicago Housing Authority and the Chicago Public Library, with the library on the first two floors and four floors of affordable senior housing above. The new library takes on a contemporary aesthetic, with plenty of windows to allow natural light to flood inside. The branch will have learning spaces for all age groups, a multi-purpose community room, and a dedicated play area. John Ronaan Architects, a finalist in the competition to build the Obama Presidential Library, was chosen from a group of three finalists to design the new library.

I want to thank the Friends of Independence Library, West Walker Civic Association, Greater Independence Park Neighborhood Association, Old Irving Park Association, Rep. Jaime Andrade, the Mayor's office, Ald. Marge Laurino, Ald. Deb Mell, Ald. Carlos Ramirez-Rosa, and all the residents and neighborhood groups who advocated to make this happen.
