Treasurer's Report: The Treasurer's report for July was presented by Lynn Ankney and unanimously approved by the Board of Directors.

New Businesses / Developments:

39th Ward Business

- RLM Events & Design, 4042 North Pulaski Avenue. RLM Events & Design has requested a zoning change from B1 to B3 to enable the proprietors to operate as a limited restaurant with an incidental liquor license. The venue is limited to 48 people; RLM plans to prepare food on-site and carry alcohol for small events on-site and a catering license for off-site contracts. The Board agreed that OIPA would reach out to the adjacent condo association for feedback on the request. Our existing letter of support is specific to the proposed activity of RLM; however, it should be noted that the zoning change is permanent. That said, the zoning change fits within the neighborhood specs.
- Cozy Corner Restaurant and Pancake House, 4056 North Pulaski Avenue.

The proprietors of Cozy Corner have requested to convert West Belle Plaine Avenue to a two-way road west of Pulaski to the alley. Such a conversion

would allow patrons more straightforward access to Cozy Corner's rear and reduce traffic on residential streets.

The Board unanimously voted in favor of this request and will issue a letter of support.

4300 Kedvale Avenue

"Pre" construction activity has resumed. OIPA submitted an inquiry on 9/2/21 to the 39th Ward regarding permits/plans.

• 4101 W Montrose Avenue—No updates

Cullom Avenue

Awaiting restoration between Kostner and Pulaski Avenues following the water main work.

OIPA had previously requested "No Trucks" signs along this same stretch of Cullom before the water main work. The 39th Ward has advised us the signs have been approved. We have asked for more information regarding the installation date, location, and whether or not local businesses have been notified regarding these signs ahead of installation.

45th Ward Business

- **People's Gas parcel:** Awaiting the scheduling of a community meeting. The city's planning division is interested in community feedback—no additional updates.
- Sears/Novak Development, 4730 W. Irving Park: On September 8, the City Council's Committee on Zoning signed off on the proposal to redevelop the parcel(s) into a six-story mixed-use development. A final vote on the project is expected during the September 14 City Council meeting.
- Northwestern Medical Group (NMG): In response to community concerns regarding the proposed

demolition of 3936 N Kenneth Avenue, OIPA issued a letter to NMG, DPD, and Alderman Gardiner communicating our concerns. We will reach out again to engage with all involved parties regarding the future parcel's usage.

- 3800 N. Milwaukee—no updates
- Advocate Medical Office Building by GW to be built on the land now a vacant parking lot adjacent to Ross/DD's—no updates.
- Clarendale at 6 Corners—no updates
- **4524 W. Irving Park Road** (A nine-flat condo unit): Demolition and construction are expected to start soon (information provided by a neighbor).

Mural Proposals:

• Irving Park Road proposal Financial commitments

– OIPA	\$1,500
– Six Corners Association	\$1,500
– Clarendale	\$3,000

The project is awaiting final approval from the city (DCASE) and Metra. OIPA is currently considering the ongoing budget for yearly maintenance of all murals we've sponsored previously.

Editor's note: Since the minutes have been recorded, the Irving Park Road "bird" mural is close to completion. Images of the mural are on the next page.

Favorite Birding Spots in the Chicago Area

There are so many great birding spots in the Chicago area, and they vary a lot by season. According to *eBird*, the top three spots in the Chicago area by bird species count are Montrose Point Bird Sanctuary, Illinois Beach State Park, and Jackson Park. But there are great birding hotspots all over the area, so read through the longer lists by region.

City of Chicago - North

Montrose Point Bird Sanctuary Arguably, the best single birding spot in the Chicago area, the promontory and adjacent dune habitats contain what is probably the region's most heavily birded site: the famous "Magic Hedge."

North Pond Nature Sanctuary North Pond is a 12acre nature sanctuary that attracts many land and waterbirds during migration seasons.

North Park Village Nature Center A hidden nature oasis on the far north side, this Chicago Park District nature preserve contains 46 acres of woodlands, wetlands and grassland.

Northerly Island Long known as the best single location in Illinois for Snowy Owls, this site holds promise for becoming a migrant hotspot once a restoration program is completed.

Bill Jarvis Migratory Bird Sanctuary Birders walk the edge of this 6.5-acre fenced sanctuary in Lincoln Park to see and hear the large variety of migrants that use this wooded oasis.

Illinois Beach State Park This park, with its dunes and swales, supports a variety of flora and fauna unsurpassed anywhere else in the state.

City of Chicago - South

Jackson Park - Wooded Island This 543-acre unit of the Chicago Park District provides a mosaic of lakefront, open water, marsh, grassland and woods.

Washington Park Washington Park is a large park in Chicago's Hyde Park neighborhood. The Park consists of two large loops; one north and one south of Morgan Drive and contains a wide variety of habitat types ranging from grassy meadow to forest to lagoon.

Hegewisch Marsh Park and Natural Area Hegewisch Marsh is 129 acres of native marsh, wetland, and wet prairie habitats along the Calumet River. The site has over a mile of trails through the scenic park.

Deadstick Pond In addition to the many common species that regularly appear, such rarities as Marbled Godwit, Red Knot and Long-billed Dowitcher have also been observed.

Big Marsh Park and Natural Area Its open water attracts a myriad of waterfowl, and the marshy portions have provided nesting habitat for Pied-billed Grebes, Least Bitterns and Common Moorhens.

Indian Ridge Marsh Indian Ridge Marsh is 154 acres of native marsh and wet prairie habitat.

Lake Calumet (IBA) A surprisingly large variety of birds, of which 100 species nest.

Eggers Grove The 250 acres of primarily marsh and oaks support a host of migrants (from ducks to warblers and sparrows), while such uncommon species as Virginia Rail and Yellow-headed Blackbird have nested here.



NATURE IN THE CITY

South Shore Nature Sanctuary Given its varied plantings and location, the site hosts numerous migrants and wintering ducks.

McCormick Place Bird Sanctuary Chicago's newest lakefront preserve for migratory birds

City of Chicago - West

Douglass Park Two lagoons (complete with an island), marsh, shrubs and wildflowers make this park an attractive stopover for many migrants.

Humboldt Park Humboldt Park is a large park in Chicago's Humboldt Park neighborhood on the western side of the city. Several intertwining loops intersect the park. East of Humboldt Dr., follow a loop around the big lagoon to look for ducks in the open water, as well as Great Blue Herons, Green Herons and Black-crowned Night-Herons along the water's edge and warblers among the tree tops.

Garfield Park This park has one lagoon with marshy borders and an island, as well as upland shrubby areas.

Columbus Park Columbus Park is a National Historic Landmark and is considered the masterpiece of Jens Jensen, now known as the dean of Prairie-style landscape architecture.

OIPA President Adrienne Chan opened the meeting with the organization's statement regarding Alderman Jim Gardiner's alleged behavior currently under investigation and shared below. September 14, 2021: The Old Irving Park Association is a 501c3 organization that prohibits us from making political statements or endorsements. We believe the recent reporting detailing Alderman Gardiner's behavior, if true, rises above anything political. You can be confident our Board unanimously denounced the derogatory language and retaliatory actions recently attributed to the Alderman and reported in the media. We would typically shy away from making any public

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statement but would like to let our neighbors and members know where we stand.

Redistricting Changes

And finally, **State Rep. Jaime Andrade (D)** spoke to the group regarding the new redistricting plan for Chicago and how it impacts our neighborhood. Redistricting is the once-every-decade process of redrawing a state's political boundaries to reflect population changes after completing the decennial federal census. The Illinois General Assembly approved new legislative maps for both the state House districts and Senate districts. What does that mean for us? Andrade appo

What does that mean for us? Andrade announced that **State Senator Robert F. Martwick (D)** and **State Representative Lindsey LaPointe (D)** will represent the majority of OIP beginning January 2023. OIPA plans to invite both LaPointe and Martwick to an upcoming meeting to discuss their respective vision for our neighborhood and how they plan to best represent us in Springfield.


Her program will look at public and private gardens (and their creators) — from the quirky and magical to the elegant and innovative — and the plants and garden art within them.

Chicago's New: Electronics Recycling Program

N ow it's easier than ever to properly dispose of your old electronics. Till the end of the year, the City of Chicago is hosting dozens of drop-off recycling events across the city.

What's accepted? The following household electronics (and only these) are accepted:

Cell Phones • Computers • Video Game Consoles • Computer Monitors • Portable Digital Music Players • TVs • Digital Converter Boxes • Printer, Fax, Scanners • Cable & Satellite Receivers • Keyboards & Mice • Small-Scale Servers • VCRs, DVD Players, DVD Recorders

Electronics from businesses are not accepted.

It's the law, and it's good for the environment

too. Old electronics are chockful of precious metals and rare earth elements that are in short supply. They also contain toxic chemicals that should not end up in a landfill. That's why dozens of states, including the State of Illinois, have electronic recycling or 'e-waste' laws that require that old electronics be responsibly recycled.

Drop-off Locations Please note that once the truck is full, no more electronics will be accepted. Materials should not be left outside of operating hours. ONLY the electronics listed above are eligible for recycling.

Commercial and other residential electronics are not accepted. Note that the Household Chemicals and Computer Recycling Facility at 1150 North Branch Street, also accepts household chemicals.

Drop-off Procedure The city has implemented extra safety precautions due to Covid-19. Social distancing between staff and the public will be a priority. You will be asked to remain in the vehicle and automatically open your trunk or door, if you can.

If the door or trunk cannot be opened from inside your car, you'll be asked to manually open them, and step back 6 feet so the staff can gather your electronics.

Are your old electronics still working? For electronics that are still in working order, please consider trading them in, selling them, or donating them, rather than recycling them. Allowing your unwanted electronics to be reused provides more environmental benefits than recycling, and you could recoup some of your original cost too.

Most major electronics retailers, such as Best Buy, Apple, Decluttr, Amazon Trade-In, ItsWorthMore, and Dell offer trade-in programs for used electronics (any brand). And most will allow you to verify the tradein value of your items on-line and provide a return shipping label so you don't even have to visit the store.

Check out "Best places to sell your used electronics for 2021" at CNET, https://www.cnet.com/tech/mobile/ best-places-to-sell-electronics. For fixing electronics any kind of household item ,check out Repair Café in Oak Park, https://repaircafeoakparkil.org.

Another option for your working electronics is to list them on popular consumer-to-consumer marketplaces such as eBay, Craigslist, Facebook Marketplace and Nextdoor's classified sections. It takes a bit more effort but might reward you with more money in return. And your items will not end up in a land fill.

Want to Help OIP Lead the City in Recycling?

I do, join me!

What he worst recycling rate of 8.8%, Chicago has the worst recycling record of any major U.S. city. By comparison, Seattle recycles 60% of its trash, while Los Angeles recycles 76%, and San Francisco outdoes us almost tenfold with an 80% recycling rate. Ready to take the challenge to raise our recycling score? First we have to tackle a few recycling problems.

What's the problem with recycling in Chicago? Well, the answer can be complicated. One major problem with recycling here is that people often put items that cannot be recycled into the blue bins. Common examples include plastic bags (sometimes filled with recyclables), soiled food containers, Styrofoam, and electronics. People also "wish-cycle" when they place something in a blue bin that they hope is recyclable (think plastic toy action figures or wire hangers). When non-recyclables are placed in the bin, the entire bin is often considered "spoiled" and discarded by the haulers with the other garbage in a landfill.

Here are some recycling tips:

- Empty and then wipe or rinse out food containers;
- Tear off and discard greasy pizza box tops and recycle the bottoms;
- Ditch the plastic bags and place recyclables in the bin loose;

enjoyed life and cherished my experience as the Portage Park Handyman until retiring and moving to the suburbs. I found working as a handyman personally and professionally rewarding.

After gaining skills while working with my carpenter brother on a second-floor home addition and learning how to run a business from working for one of the handyman franchises, I decided to start my own business. In 2004, I founded The Portage Park Handyman Service (PPHS). I ran my business for 15 wonderful years. Calls still come in asking for services.

It's easy to be happy if you love the work you do—it was more than 'fix things' to me. Knowing I was providing a valuable service and the gratitude a homeowner expressed was a good day at work. I served people by repairing and maintaining their homes for the better!

I helped a woman stay in her home by adding rails so she could move around the house safely. Her housekeeper said, "God sent you."

A young mother would wake her napping toddler when she touched the squeaky bedroom door. A dab of Vaseline applied on the hinge pins made her life easier. And her toddler appreciated that the 'door monsters' were gone.

One solution to a common problem in the city—garage break-ins—was quickly remedied. Switching 1" strike plate screws with 2 1/2" screws that go through the jamb and the (2x4) prevented service door break-ins.

Most calls for services came on Monday. Each week was a new adventure. I could start with nothing scheduled and then have completed repairs to five homes by the end of the day. To save trips to the

hardware store, I always had a van full of tools, materials, and frequently used items. My vacations included Hardware Shows to learn new techniques.

I attribute my success to answering and returning calls, showing up when I said I would, going the extra mile, and cleaning up. I have fond memories thinking of all the delighted customers I had the pleasure of serving. Thanks to my customers, friends, and neighbors, Portage Park was a great place to live and run a business.

CHAPTER 7-12 Animal care & Control

Dog Owners are You Aware of Our City's Leash Laws?

A friendly PSA reminding folks to leash their dog. Not only is it the neighborly thing to do, keeping your dog on a leash in public spaces is the law. Chicago's leash law requires that dogs be restrained when in public spaces, either with a leash, crate, cage, or vehicle, or confined on the owner's premises (in a fenced-in yard, not roaming free). This helps ensures the safety of both the pet and people.

Local parks require that dogs be leased. Small playlots such as Kolmar Playlot do not allow dogs in the park.

Fines range from a minimum of \$300, to \$10,000 depending on the level of the offense. In addition to a fine, if there is an injury to an individual or property damage, the dog owner may be required to submit full restitution to the victim.




